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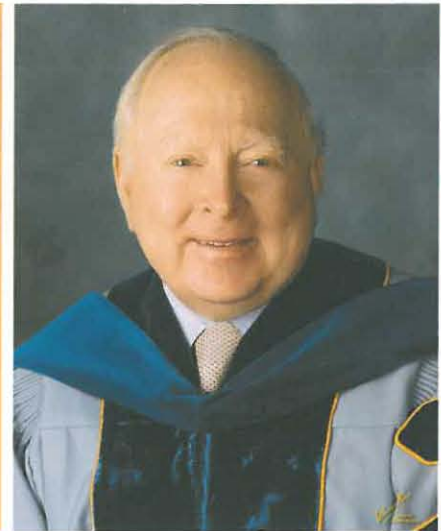
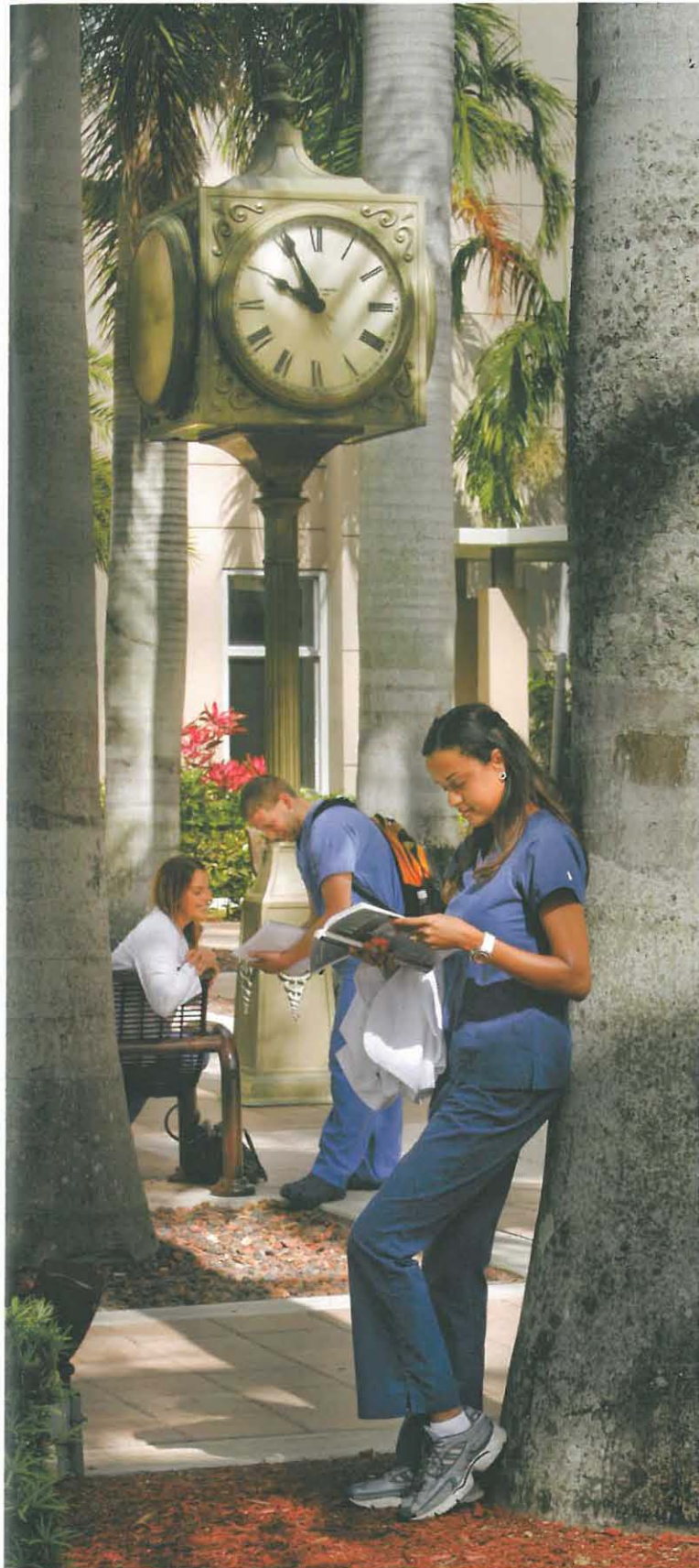
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As a student in the Health Professions Division of Nova Southeastern University, you can anticipate a remarkable experience. You will train, study, interact, and share faculty and resources (either campus-based or online) with students from various backgrounds and disciplines. This interdisciplinary approach distinguishes the Health Professions Division as unique and will better prepare you to master your discipline with a sensitivity and understanding of the entire health care system.

The Health Professions Division, with a student body of more than 2,500, is home to six colleges. The College of Osteopathic Medicine, the first one in the southeastern United States, grants the Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine (D.O.) degree. The College of Osteopathic Medicine also awards the Master of Public Health (M.P.H.) and the Master of Science in Biomedical Informatics (M.S.B.I.) degrees. The College of Pharmacy offers the Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) degree to entry-level and international students, as well as a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree in Pharmacy. The College of Optometry is the only institution in the state of Florida that awards the Doctor of Optometry (O.D.) degree as well as a Master of Science in Clinical Vision Research (M.S.). The College of Allied Health and Nursing offers an entry-level Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) degree, as well as an R.N. to B.S.N. program, a Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.) degree, a post-M.S.N. certificate, and a Ph.D. in nursing education. The college also offers physician assistant programs that award the Master of Medical Science (M.M.S.) degree in Physician Assistant, as well as programs offering a Master of Occupational Therapy

(M.O.T.) degree and an entry-level Doctor of Physical Therapy (D.P.T.) degree. Doctoral programs are offered in occupational therapy (Ph.D./O.T., Dr.OT), physical therapy (Ph.D./P.T., D.P.T.), and audiology (Au.D.). In addition to these programs, the College of Allied Health and Nursing offers the Bachelor of Health Science (B.H.Sc.), Master of Health Science (M.H.Sc.), and Doctor of Health Science (D.H.Sc.) degrees—open to midlevel clinicians and allied health professionals—and a Ph.D. degree in Health Science. There are also specializations in Bachelor of Health Science—Vascular Sonography, Master of Health Science—Vascular Sonography, and Master of Health Science—Anesthesiologist Assistant, as well as specializations in Cardiovascular Sonography for both the Bachelor of Health Science and the Master of Health Science. The College of Medical Sciences grants the Master of Biomedical Sciences (M.B.S.) degree. In the fall of 1997, the College of Dental Medicine admitted its charter class into the Doctor of Dental Medicine (D.M.D.) program. Now, the college also offers a Master of Science in Dentistry (M.Sc.D.) degree, as well as postgraduate programs in endodontics, oral surgery, orthodontics, pediatric dentistry, periodontics, and prosthodontics.

The Health Professions Division occupies a \$70 million complex, covering 21 acres of the university campus. The division includes eight buildings totaling more than 900,000 square feet of space for classrooms, laboratories, offices, the Health Professions Division Library, an outpatient health center, and a pharmaceutical care center. The adjacent 1,500-vehicle parking garage overlooks the Miami Dolphins Training Camp.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Doctor of Audiology (Au.D.) establishes audiologists in a clearly defined and prominent role within the hearing health care delivery system and strengthens their position as autonomous practitioners. The degree provides the academic foundation and diverse clinical experiences necessary to enter professional practice today and to stay abreast in the future. Audiologists specialize in the evaluation, diagnosis, management, and treatment of people of all ages with auditory and vestibular disorders. At Nova Southeastern University, the audiology department benefits from the integrated multidisciplinary health care programs of the university's Health Professions Division. Doctor of Audiology students enroll in a clinically focused professional doctoral program where students complete a rigorous academic curriculum coupled with extensive and diverse clinical experiences.

COURSE OF STUDY

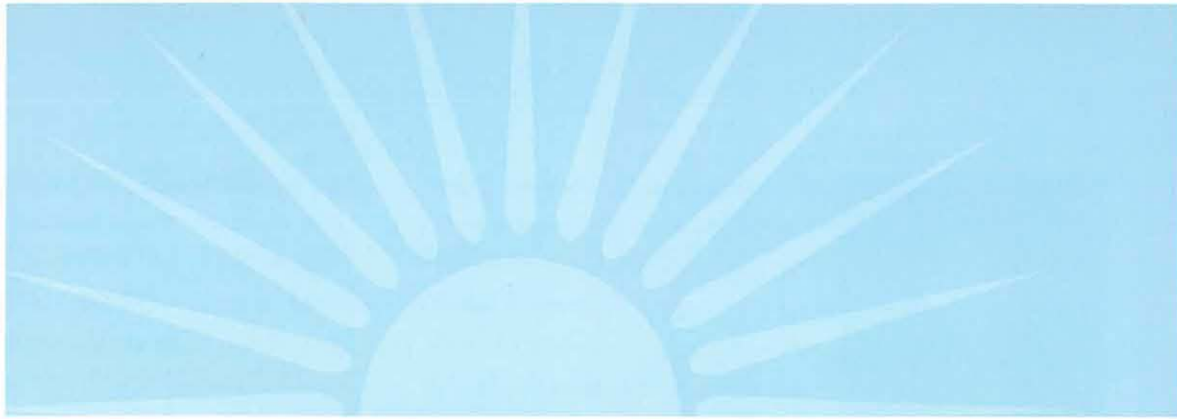
The Doctor of Audiology degree is awarded after successful completion of four years of professional study. Beginning in the first year, students are given clinical assignments and experiences. There will be increased clinical involvement throughout the program as students prepare for direct patient care at our clinics and at locations throughout the community. The fourth year is designed to be a full-time externship work experience that prepares the student to enter the profession at graduation. Successful completion of the Doctor of Audiology program, coupled with a passing score on the National Praxis Examination for audiology, will enable graduates to be licensed.

In these programs, the college has Bachelor and Master of Health Science specializations in Vascular Sonography, Bachelor and Master of Health Science specializations in Cardiovascular Sonography, and a Master of Health Science specialization in Anesthesiologist Assistant. These degrees for practicing health care professionals are delivered mainly through the use of innovative distance technology.

Consistently recognized as a “Best Career” or “Hot Job” for the past four years by *U.S. News & World Report*, *Kiplinger’s Personal Finance*, and *Career Cast*, audiology has distinguished itself among the health care professions as a desirable and rewarding career. According to the U.S. Department of Labor, job growth in audiology is expected to

increase by 25 percent through the year 2018. Due to the rapid growth of our 55+ population, and given the association between aging and hearing loss, highly trained professionals to provide hearing and balance services will be in great demand. Additionally, advances in survival rates for premature infants and mandatory newborn hearing screenings have increased the need for audiology services in the pediatric population.

Our program at NSU is designed to prepare students to enter the profession of audiology ready to practice. We offer diverse clinical experiences and coursework that prepare students for today and tomorrow. In addition to our traditional audiology curriculum, we are among the few Au.D. programs offering coursework in genetics and hearing loss, biochemistry and pharmacology, business/practice management and leadership, and gerontology.

Our Student Academy of Audiology (SAA) chapter is active in international humanitarian and community service activities. From local health fairs to outreach with underserved migrant workers and their families to hospital

and nursing home-based initiatives, our students bring their enthusiastic spirit of volunteerism to working with these populations. Additionally, our students have participated in trips to Guatemala through the Ronald McDonald Foundation to fit children with hearing aids and to Trinidad to evaluate children, fit them with hearing aids, and participate in teacher training workshops on the effects of hearing loss on communication. A mission to the British Virgin Islands, coordinated by one of our current students, took place in the spring of 2011.

Personally, as a member of the audiology faculty for more than 12 years, I have watched it grow into one of the most well-respected programs in the country. I am proud of what we have built and are offering at Nova Southeastern University.

POSTBACHELOR'S DOCTOR OF AUDIOLOGY PROGRAM

Prospective Doctor of Audiology students are selected by an admissions committee. Selection is based on preprofessional academic performance, written application, letters of recommendation, Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores, and a personal interview.

The Audiology Department requires applicants to have completed a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university. Preference will be given to students with a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.2 or higher.

MATRICULATION REQUIREMENTS

The following prerequisite coursework is required

- Neuroanatomy 3 semester hours

The Neuroanatomy course is available in an online format from NSU during the summer semester prior to beginning the program in the fall semester.

Six hours of coursework in speech and language disorders is required before graduation and three hours of coursework in Normal Language is required before taking Pediatric Audiology. Students must demonstrate understanding of the speech and language difficulties associated with hearing impairment; therefore, the department recommends a course in speech and language of the hearing impaired. An overview course in speech and language is also recommended. If a student did not complete these courses as an undergraduate, he or she can take them during the Au.D. course of study. However, they require separate registration and tuition.

ACCREDITATIONS

The audiology program is dually accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation (CAA) of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) and the Accreditation Commission for Audiology Education (ACAE). Graduates will have completed the academic and clinical requirements necessary to be eligible to apply for a license as an audiologist and pursue board certification in audiology from the American Board of Audiology, and may elect to seek the Certificate of Clinical Competence from ASHA.

Nova Southeastern University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (1866 Southern Lane, Decatur, Georgia 30033-4097, Telephone number: 404-679-4501) to award associate's, bachelor's, master's, educational specialist, and doctoral degrees.

Preference will be given to applications received prior to February 15.

PERSONAL INTERVIEW

Completed applications are reviewed by the admissions committee and invitations are extended for a personal interview to the highest-ranking students. Interviews are held on campus and provide the student an opportunity to meet faculty members and students and to visit the campus.

Notice of acceptance into the program will be on a rolling or periodic schedule; therefore early completion of the application is in the best interest of the student.

Students are provisionally admitted to a degree-seeking program based on a review of unofficial transcripts or other specific program admission requirements. However, this admission includes a condition that final and official transcripts, documents, and requirements must be received within 90 calendar days from matriculation. If these final and official transcripts, documents, and/or requirements are not received by that time, the student will not be allowed to continue class attendance. Financial aid will not be disbursed to a provisional/conditional student until he or she has been fully admitted as a regular student (all admissions requirements have been approved by the college/program admissions office). Students who have an unpaid balance 30 days from the start of the term will be assessed a \$100 fee.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES FOR APPLICANTS HOLDING FOREIGN DEGREES

Applicants must submit

1. a completed application form along with a \$50, nonrefundable application fee
2. three letters of academic recommendation from professors and/or supervisors (must use the NSU Audiology Department evaluation form)
3. all coursework from international institution(s), if applicant attended or is a graduate of any international institution(s)

TUITION AND FEES

1. Payment of tuition and fees is expected at the time of registration. Students receiving financial aid are responsible for making sure that they have completed all applications for financial aid and that it has been granted.
2. Tuition for 2011–2012 is \$20,250. Tuition for 2012–2013 will subsequently be posted on our Web site (www.nova.edu/aud). A Health Professions Division general access fee of \$145 is required each year. An NSU student services fee of \$750 is also required annually. All tuition and fees are subject to change by the board of trustees without notice.
3. Upon acceptance, students planning to enroll are required to complete an intent to enroll form with a nonrefundable deposit of \$500. This advance payment will be deducted from the tuition payment due at registration.

The financial ability of applicants to complete their training is important because of the limited number of positions available. Applicants should have specific plans for financing four years of professional education. This should include provision for tuition, living expenses, books, and related expenses.

COMPUTER REQUIREMENTS

Students are expected to have a computer with PowerPoint, Word, and Excel software. Some programs used to augment coursework require a computer with the Windows Operating System.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

Individuals seeking to transfer to the NSU Doctor of Audiology program must submit an application and follow the application and admissions process. The audiology department will consider the transfer of credits from another academic institution. A maximum of 9 semester hours can be transferred. Eligibility for course transfer requires a grade of B or better and must be accompanied by an official course description. Credits must be earned within six years prior to program admission.
