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
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AN OVERVIEW OF NOVA UNIVERSITY

Based on the philosophy that institutions are vehicles designed and redesigned to meet personal, social, and career needs of people in a changing society, Nova continually questions traditional education and strives to find alternative delivery methods. With students studying in Florida, in 32 other states, and in several foreign countries, as well as seven Canadian provinces and territories, Nova University is truly an international institution.

Nova is a "learner's university," using the student's experience to make education meaningful and exciting. The University has distinguished itself by its innovative outlook, its unique systems of delivery, and its research in many fields aimed at solving problems of immediate concern to mankind.



Now, let the institute begin!




