GOLD KEY, with its Second Annual Dinner a success; with strongly-functioning officers and directors; with by-laws adopted; and an impressive list of accomplishments; greets with confidence and high hopes, the challenges of 1968.

PLANS FOR '68

To stage two outstanding dinners — fall and spring;
To increase, by invitation and careful selection, its membership to a minimum of one hundred;

To ally members more closely with the University, to have them more fully informed on University programs and goals and accomplishments.

President Winstead said he hoped GOLD KEY would become a training ground for future University Trustees.

(James Donn, Jr., a GOLD KEY director, was elected a University Trustee in October, 1967.)

A GOLD KEY member, R. E. Welch of the Welch Scientific Co., Illinois, made a gift, in addition to his membership contribution, of a Turbo Molecular pump (\$5,300), a Cyro Refrigerator (\$395) and other gear, for a total value of \$6,094, for use by Dr. Raymond Pepinsky, Research Professor of Chemistry and Physics . . . at present Mr. Welch is readying a special densitometer and photometer unit that will be extremely useful to the University.

“. . . If GOLD KEY remains closest to, and most knowledgeable about, Nova University; if its social aspects are continued and its programs are kept on the highest-quality level; and if it is a real factor in the development of the University; then it will be the real “In” group, and will have people waiting to get on its membership rolls.”

In their first meeting of 1968 (January 4) the new officers and directors of GOLD KEY made great plans, heard enthusiastic predictions like the above, and chartered a definitive series of steps toward accomplishment of these purposes.

James Farquhar, chairman of the Nova Board of Trustees and the guest of President Cy Young at the GOLD KEY luncheon, was requested to consult the University Administration regarding the establishment of a GOLD KEY Chair in one of the sciences.

As Director Robert G. Friedman and President Young pointed out, few foundations, and far fewer individuals, can endow a University chair, but a man's \$1,000 membership fee, combined with those of 99 others, is the equivalent of the interest from a \$2,000,000.00 Trust . . . and that is GOLD KEY's immediate goal.

AUGUST BURGHARD, long time resident and active in historical and conservation fields, is Executive Director of GOLD KEY.

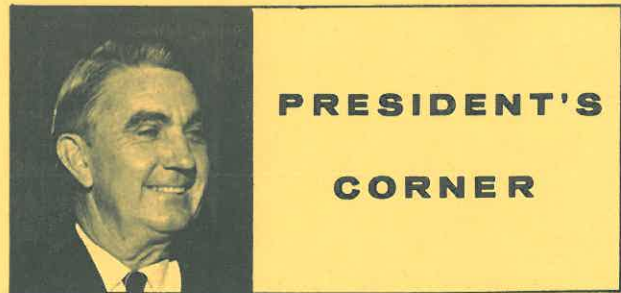

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 1967 (Cont'd)

By far, the most important accomplishment last year was its success in interesting and educating an important segment of the Broward County leadership on the economic and cultural wealth implicit in the development of Nova University;

In its ability to provide needed income for the University in its critical formative years;

And the creation through the University of a climate conducive to the greater intellectual and economic growth of Broward County.

GOLD KEY received its first officers in May, 1967.

The Board, consisting of Robert O. Barber, Gregory J. Barry, L. F. R. Bellows, James Donn, Jr., Russell French, Leo Goodwin, Jr., and Frederick B. Youngblood, held its first meeting on May 12 and unanimously elected Mr. Youngblood president.

Director R. O. Barber offered GOLD KEY the use of closed-circuit TV equipment from Univis to record, for GOLD KEY's Annual Spring Dinner, the world vision of the need in Southeast America for an institution such as Nova as expressed by Nova's distinguished Advisory Board, which assembles here next month.
