





FACT SHEET



Fact I — Volunteer blood donors - nearly 200 of them are needed every day for the following reasons:

- 1. Over 100 people use an average of two pints each day in Broward County.
- 2. Area hospitals must have blood of each group and type in stock for emergencies. This will require more than 50,000 pints this year.
- 3. Blood cannot be stockpiled. The shelf life for red cells is 35 days.
- 4. Broward County needs volunteer blood. Patients need to be protected from the risk of hepatitis associated with the use of paid donors.
- 5. To be eligible to give blood, a donor must be at least 17 years of age and weigh 100 pounds. There is no upper age limit. People over 65 years may donate if they are in good health.

Fact II — An adequate blood supply is absolutely essential to the following:

- 1. Patients undergoing surgery including open heart surgery;
- 2. Patients being treated for cancer;
- 3. Patients with hemophilia, anemia or low protein production;
- 4. Patients with severe burns;
- 5. Patients with traumatic injuries such as auto accidents.

Facts III — Blood requires 24-hour service, 365 days per year.

This is how it is provided by the Broward Community Blood Center:

- 1. Four bloodmobiles are available daily to go where large groups of potential donors are available in industry, businesses, schools, community centers, churches or union halls.
- 2. BCBC donor centers are open 7 days per week.
- 3. Since blood must be grouped, typed, tested and processed into components, laboratory staff are on duty seven days per week.
- 4. Since blood must be delivered at all hours, laboratory delivery staff are on duty 24-hours per day, 365 days per year.

Fact IV — Blood therapy is not a simple matter of transfusing whole blood. Medical advances require the following products from blood processing:

- 1. Red cells are used for about 90% of all blood needs. They keep 35 days in storage.
- 2. Platelets are required for clotting and are used in cancer treatment and for bleeding problems. Weekend donations are necessary to supply these patients:
- 3. Platelets can be obtained by a special pheresis procedure from specially recruited donors who get their red cells and plasma back after the platelets are removed. White cells can also be obtained this way. Pheresis donors are continually needed.
- 4. Plasma can be frozen and stored for up to a year of it can be processed into cryoprecipitate, which can be stored frozen for several months. It can be made into anti-hemophilic factor, serum albumin, or gamma globulin, all products in high demand.
- 5. Frozen red cells can be stored indefinitely, but once reconstituted, must be used in 24-hours. The whole procedure is extremely costly and is used primarily for preservation of rare blood.

Fact V — Providing blood service for an area where more than one million people work and live is a continuous challenge. Every 14 minutes a surgical patient at a county hospital receives a blood transfusion; thus, blood is required daily to meet the needs of county patients.


For the convenience of donors, BCBC maintains separate branch stations throughout the county, including the new headquarters facility in Lauderhill. Donors must be at least 17 and weigh no less than 100 pounds. Senior citizens are not restricted from giving as long as they are in good health. The entire donation process takes about 30 minutes.

Besides helping to save lives, blood donors are also very special people to the Broward County Blood Center. To such individuals, BCBC makes the following pledge:

As long as you are an active donor with the Broward Community Blood Center, blood will always be available should you or anyone in your family ever require a transfusion; in addition, if the hospitalization occurs outside the BCBC service area and the local blood center is unable to meet your needs, we will make all necessary arrangements to insure that the required amount of blood is delivered promptly.

NOVA COLLEGE ANNOUNCES ITS FIRST FIELD STUDY

IN LATIN AMERICAN AND CARIBBEAN STUDIES

SOC 485 - Field Study in Latin American & Caribbean Studies will be offered Term 5 (May 7-July 2)

The course will consist of on-campus seminars and study and a 3-week program of total immersion in the language and life of Chalchihuites, a small rural town in the foothills of the Sierra Madre Occidental in the state of Zacatecas, Mexico. Students will live with local families while attending innovative language and culture classes and participating in a voluntary work program which is integrated into the daily life of the town. An optional travel week is possible for students interested in extending their stay in Mexico.

Students will be awarded 9 credits for the course, applicable toward the Certificate in Latin American & Caribbean Studies. Tuition will include all on-campus instruction, roundtrip air fare to Mexico, room and board with an appropriate family, language instruction, seminars and excursions. The optional travel week and incidental expenses are additional.

Enrollment in SOC 485 is limited to ten (10) students. Although language proficiency is not a requirement for the program, preference will be give to students enrolled in SOC 250, Native Cultures of the Americas - Term 4.
