

About Nova Southeastern University...

Nova Southeastern University is South Florida's multidisciplinary center devoted to providing educational programs of distinction from prekindergarten through the doctoral level. From its beginning in 1964, NSU has distinguished itself through innovation, offering traditional and nontraditional programs and promoting research into social and human problems of immediate and long-range concern.

The university includes academic centers in allied health, business and entrepreneurship, computer and information sciences, dental medicine, education, family education, law, medical sciences, oceanography, optometry, osteopathic medicine, pharmacy, psychology, social and systemic studies, and undergraduate studies.

The Main Campus is located on 232 acres in suburban Fort Lauderdale and features the Farquhar Center for Undergraduate Studies, Health Professions Division, Center for Psychological Studies, Shepard Broad Law Center, and University School. The East Campus, near



downtown Fort Lauderdale, houses our School of Business and Entrepreneurship, School of Computer and Information Sciences, and the School of Social and Systemic Studies. The Oceanographic Center is located on 10 acres adjacent to Port Everglades. And the Fischler Center for the Advancement of Education is located at the North Miami Beach Campus. NSU also offers classes at the Coral Springs Campus, in locations across Florida, and in 21 states and several foreign countries.

Operating on an annual budget of approximately \$187 million, NSU is the largest private, independent institution of higher education in Florida, based on Fall Term enrollment, and has produced more than 50,000 alumni.

About Broward County, about Fort Lauderdale...

Twenty-three miles of wide sandy beaches stretch enticingly along calm, azure Atlantic waters--from Palm Beach in the north to Miami in the south. More than 300 miles of navigable inland waterways, part of the Intracoastal system, wind through palatial estates, citrus groves and exotic Everglades--beckoning boats of all sizes and shapes. And there are plenty of attractions to tempt landlubbers as well.

This is Greater Fort Lauderdale. For an area covering 1,196 square miles--two thirds of which lie in the Everglades--and a population of 1.2 million, the diversity of attractions and activities on and off the beach in Broward County is surprising. It's no wonder that sun seekers from all over the world come here to play, relax, shop, dine, sportfish, dive, boat and sightsee. It's also no wonder that Broward County is one of the fastest growing residential areas in the country-visitors tend to like it so much, they move in.

Broward's climate is tropical with an average year-round temperature of 77 degrees and 3,000 hours of sunshine. Winter temperatures average a mean of 66 degrees; summer, a mean of 84 degrees. January is the coolest month of the year and August is the warmest. The heaviest rainfalls occur during August and September.

As for sports, South Florida has it all. Besides the natural abundance of water sports, boating and fishing, there are numerous inland activities, including:

golf, with more than 50 courses in Broward ranging from a par 3 to the most challenging courses; tennis, with more than 550 public and private tennis courts throughout Broward County; and parimutuels, which includes greyhound racing at Hollywood Greyhound Track, hamess racing at Pompano Park Harness Track, jai-alai at Dania Jai-Alia, and thoroughbred racing at Gulfstream Park.

Fort Lauderdale is also just minutes from some of the nation's top professional sports attractions. Immediately south of Broward County lies Pro Player Stadium, home of the Miami Dolphins and Florida Marlins. The Miami Heat and Florida Panthers also play just 20 minutes south of Fort Lauderdale in the Miami Arena. The Panthers, however, will be leaving Miami for a new Broward County arena in time for their 1998-99 season. South Florida is also home to the Orange Bowl and CARQUEST Bowl, the Lipton Tennis Tournament, and The Honda Classic and Doral-Ryder Open golf tournaments.

Numerous attractions also abound, such as Butterfly World, Everglades Holiday Park, Flamingo Gardens, the Goodyear Blimp base, Grand Prix Race-O-Rama, and Sawgrass Recreation Park. These, along with the area's performing arts and shopping facilities, make Fort Lauderdale the perfect place to reside and study.


Meet the Director of Athletics, Corey Johnson...

Two years, two Florida Sun Conference All-Sports Trophies. That is the impact that Corey Johnson has had on the Nova Southeastern University department of athletics since his arrival in July of 1995. From that moment, Johnson has stressed not only the excellence in education that NSU athletes are known for, but also excellence on the field. Nova Southeastern University teams have continually responded to his challenges, as the Knights have nine first place finishes and three team national tournament appearances in various sports in just two seasons under Johnson.

A resident of Plantation, Johnson has worked in all facets of the athletics world, from being a teacher and intramural director in South Dakota, to being a head football coach in Wisconsin, to being an NCAA Division I assistant football coach at the University of Iowa and University of California at Berkeley. Johnson has seen it all in the days which led up to him accepting his first full-time collegiate administrative position as Associate Athletics Director at the University of Miami in 1983, and every day after as Director of Athletics with two other NCAA Division I programs.

It was at the University of Miami where Johnson first began making a name for himself as one of the top athletic administrators in the country. There, he was responsible for NCAA compliance and eligibility, was special projects and tournament coordinator, and was responsible for coordinating the return of Division I basketball. His supervision included 12 non-revenue sports, student-athlete housing, scholarships and financial aid. He was also there to see the university capture national championships in football, baseball and women's golf.

In 1987 he accepted a position with California State University Long Beach as Director of Athletics, Sports and Intramurals. And it was there that he proved his worth, handling a department comprised of 21 varsity and 16 club sports with more than 9,000 intramural participants (the campus had an enrollment of 34,000 students). That position led to his hiring as Director of Athletics at Colorado State University in 1991, where he was responsible for the overall operation of CSU's 16 varsity sports at a campus of 22,000 students.



Johnson departed the collegiate scene in 1994 to be Vice President of Administration and Corporate Advancement for Contemporary Services Corporation, where he worked on such special projects as the Super Bowl and World Cup Soccer. His love for collegiate athletics, however, proved to be too strong, leading to his arrival at Nova Southeastern University.

Meet the Head Coach, Frankie Delgado...

Frankie Delgado, the head boys' soccer coach this past season at Miami Sunset Senior High School, was named Nova Southeastern University's head men's soccer coach the first week of August, 1997.

Delgado, 26, replaces Munga Eketebi, who left NSU the previous month to accept an assistant coaching position with Florida International University. He also follows in the footsteps of former coach Thomas Rongen, who guided the Knights for five seasons before accepting a head coaching job with Major League Soccer in 1995, relinquishing his post to Eketebi. "I'm excited, it's a great opportunity," Delgado said. "Obviously, I feel honored to be following in their footsteps, since I've known of both of them since I was a kid; Thomas, when he played for the Strikers, and Munga from when he played at FIU. They both laid a strong foundation here at NSU, and I plan to build upon it."

A 1994 graduate of Tennessee Wesleyan College (Athens, TN), Delgado helped guide Miami Sunset to a 23-3-2 record last season, complete with a district championship and a No. 8 ranking in the state's Class 6A poll. There, he was responsible for maintaining eligibility, making travel arrangements and everyday coaching duties. His collegiate coaching experience comes from assisting at Anderson College (SC, 1994-95) and Tusculum College (TN, 1995-96). With his help, Anderson College finished ranked No. 18 in the NJCAA final poll with a 12-4-3 record, while Tusculum--in making the transition from NAIA to NCAA--went 16-5-2.

Delgado's collegiate playing experience began at Andrew College, where he was a two-year starter, one-year captain, and First Team All-South NJCAA. He was also a two-year starter and captain upon transferring to Tennessee Wesleyan College. Delgado's other soccer experience includes stints with the Texas A&M Soccer Camps (was head counselor and assistant director of the boys' camp), Ralph Lundy Soccer Camps (was head counselor) and Strike Force Soccer Club (director of player development). He was also the student assistant coach for both Tennessee Wesleyan's men's and women's teams.

Meet the Assistant Coach, Rich Barnard...

With change being in the air at Nova Southeastern University, Rich Barnard remains a constant with the NSU men's soccer program. The 1997-98 season will be Barnard's third as an assistant with the

Knights. He arrived in time for the 1995-96 season and helped Thomas Rongen's squad capture the Florida Sun Conference championship. Last year, working with Munga Eketebi,



he helped the Knights to a 12-6-1 mark and an appearance in the FSC title game.

Winning, as he's done here at Nova Southeastern University, is nothing new to Barnard. A Fort Lauderdale resident his entire life, Barnard was an All-County goalkeeper and team Most Valuable Player for Lutheran High School in 1981-82, 82-83, and was team MVP, All-County and All-State in 1984-85 in helping his South Plantation High School squad advance to the state championship match. He also set a state record with nine consecutive shutouts and 13 in one season.

Barnard attended Clemson University, playing on the defending national champion's squad until transferring to Broward Community College, where he received his associate's degree in Political Science in 1988. He then went to the University of Florida and earned his bachelor's degree in Political Science in 1991.

Q&A: Coach Frankie Delgado eyes 1997...

Q You've got much of last season's starting lineup coming back for this season. Does that make it easy on you being a new head coach knowing that veterans will make up much of the team?

"It will make things easier in the sense where I'm going to have a handful of players that are comfortable with each other. As far as eight starters coming back, the way I'm looking at it is that no starters are coming back. Everybody's new, everybody's got to win a job. That goes for the player that might have been the most successful last year to the player that was least successful last year. Everything's open, everyone's starting off on an even keel, everybody's got a job to win, everybody's got a job to lose. But in a sense of it being a situation where it's going to make things a little bit more comfortable, yes because the players know who each other are, some have played together over the summer, the majority have played together at one point or another, so they know of each other. That definitely helps.'

Q Even with that, though, there really is no such thing as "easy," is there?

A "No, it's definitely not going to be easy in a sense of me coming in here. They're going to have to get to know me quick, they've got to get used to my way of coaching, basically my way of doing things. And I'm going to have to get used to their way of doing things, how they are as individuals and try to bring them together as a team. So that will be difficult, that transition from being with Coach Munga Eketebi to being with me. There will be some personality differences, as eveybody coaches differently. That's going to be our biggest obstacle in the beginning."

Q So will this, then, be more so a transition year, or are you looking at this still saying that, even with the transition, this team can still capture the conference title?

A "My attitude is that no matter what situation you're going in to, I can have I 8 new players of which every single one of them was

new to each other, and my attitude is still going to be that we can win this. But I have the luxury of having eight starters from last year's team coming back, so there's already continuity there within the players. But, yes, I definitely am looking at the season as being a successful one. I wouldn't want to look at it any other way. I plan on it being successful, and we're going to work on it being just that."

Q How are you coming into this season, what with being a new coach? Do you know of the guys on the team, have you heard much about the NSU soccer program...?

A "I know quite a bit about the local players being that I was a local person myself. I got to see them grow up as players, I've gotten to see them playing during summers, and saw them play quite a bit last year when I came over to watch games. So in that sense I think I've got a good grasp as to what the players are like, and at the same time have had a lot of people who are very helpful and helped obtain information about the players and what they're like for me."

 \ensuremath{Q} Talk about, then, the ones that you do know, what you know about them, and how they'll be able to help you out.

"When talking about returning guys, the first one you might want to mention is Christian Goffi, last year's co-MVP of the conference. In my meetings with him, he is a very team-oriented player who is ready to go. As well as all the players, though. I don't want to single any one person out. I've met with several of them, and all of them have a go-at-it attitude, they're ready to roll. If we're going to mention players, you've got to mention seniors like Gus Bravo, who's been here from Day I, he's been through all the coaching changes. Or someone like Cliff Cameron, who's also gone through all these coaching changes. Or Warren Bloise who's been here since Day I going through, also, three coaching changes. Or Michael Rivera, and many others who I'm sure I'm leaving out, they've been through all these coaching changes and

have had to deal with them. It's going to be very important for us to get leadership from them, because they'll be able to help the ones that have only gone through one coaching change, such as Christian Goffi or Billy Ramos, players like that who have just been with Munga and are now going through a new coach in me. It's going to be very important for those that have been through a coaching change before to really step up and help these other guys out that are going through it for the first time."

Q But you know, they've had these changes before, and they've still succeeded before.

A "That has a lot to do with them. For young men, they are all extremely mature. They've got the right idea about things, they know changes are part of the deal, and they've-unfortunately--been able to get used to a revolving door. Well, I'm here to stop that revolving door. Wel're going to close the door and start some continuity here in the program. But you're right, they've been successful under all circumstances and that's why I feel that this isn't going to be a transition year even if I had wanted it to be. These players really want to go far."

Q You've got some great talent out there. Will you be relying on any individuals like a Christian Goffi, who scored 28 goals last season?

"I wouldn't even want to say that I'm just relying on Goffi. It's going to be a total team effort. Our style of play is not going to look for one person to take care of the game. It's going to involve several people being involved, it's going to take the entire team to get it done. It's going to be something where they're all going to have to step in and put effort into it, it's not going to be 'get the ball to Christian' or 'get the ball to Warren' and see what they do. We're all going to have to be playing well for us to be successful, and that's the one thing I'm going to stress. I'm not the type of person that just brings out individuals. I'm a very team-oriented person, and that's what I'm most concerned about; being a team. But talent-wise, yes, we're very strong.

We've got some nice talented transfers like Christian Cubillas, who's extremely talented on the ball, or Lenny Eterno, and everybody else. I don't want to be a person that's going to single out an individual, I'd have to sit here and name all 24 people because that's exactly what we're going to be, we're going to be a team of."

Q Talk about your style of soccer. Two years ago, Thomas Rongen was playing a 3-5-2 with a huge offensive push, while last year Munga comes in and plays a 4-4-2 which more so utilized the crisp passing game rather than the long ball. What will you be bring in?

"My style of play is similar to last years, a 4-4-2 that knocks the ball around and uses the skills that these players have. The only difference is that we're going to get more players involved into the attack. Our goal is to attack with a minimum of seven players, instead of the traditional six. At the same time, we'll try and bring up an eighth attacker to really get teams on their heels. We want to get teams to play on their side of the field. A lot of players will be going forward, and our defenders will be doing a lot of defending on counter-attacks in which it will put pressure on them. But when you're talking about lason Morris and Billy Ramos, two guys that helped solidify the defense last year and know each other well, it's a plus. Plus, Lenny Eterno-who's a proven defender/midfielder--and Gus Bravo--another proven defender/midfielder-you've got some good players. Then you talk about the freshmen that Coach Eketebi brought in, judging by his nose for talent, I know we're going to have some fine players there as well."

Q So it's not going to be much of a change for them, will it?

A "No, not at all, I don't think it will be much of a change. The only change will be that we might attack a little bit more and be a bit more aggressive. I can't predict anything about the goals or the wins or anything like that, but they're definitely going to enjoy the way we play. We're definitely going to bring out an entertaining brand of soccer."

A look back: The 1996 men's soccer season...

August 31, 1996: Florida Institute of Technology (FIT) scored three goals in three minutes of play, and then withstood an onslaught of shots to defeat the visiting Knights in NSU's regular season opener, 4-1. Eddy Mendez scored the Knights' lone goal in the 68th minute, when he took a pass from Paul Quintana—who was triple-teamed at the time—and slid it into the net.

September 4: Mendez streaked down the left sideline untouched and drilled a shot past keeper James O'Connor at 110:00 (2nd overtime) to give NSU a dramatic come-from-behind 2-1 win past visiting Webber College. Fifty minutes earlier, Jason Morris tied the game at 1-1 when he put a shot into the net from 35 yards out... September 9: Christian Goffi scored his first two goals of the season and assisted on another to lead NSU past visiting Fresno Pacific University, 4-0. Eduardo Ruiz and Cliff Cameron (unassisted) also scored for the Knights... September 11: It was officially announced that defender/midfielder Gus Bravo will be forced to sit out the entire season due to a stress fracture... September 14: For the second time in two weeks, Florida Tech defeated the Knights 4-1. NSU had tied the game at 1-1 just three minutes into the second half when Goffi headed in a beautiful cross from Mendez. The Panthers, however, answered with three second half goals... September 17: Goffi scored four goals and assisted on another to lead NSU past host Palm Beach Atlantic College, 7-0, Cameron and Ruiz also scored for the Knights in the win... September 21: Host Lynn University scored two goals in the first half and one in the second to shut out the Knights, 3-0, in Boca Raton. Goffi was also handed his fifth yellow card of the season, forcing him to sit out the next game against St. Thomas University... September 25: Warren Bloise scored the only goal of the game when he took a pass from Quintana and beat St. Thomas keeper Gary Bass, who was out of the net, in the 8th minute of play to lead NSU to the 1-0 Florida Sun Conference win past the Bobcats...

October 4: Morris scored just five minutes into the second 15-minute overtime period to give the Knights a 4-3 win past host Florida Atlantic University. Morris was the recipient of a free kick, delivered by Billy Ramos. Morris took the pass and drilled it into the far right corner, putting an end to FAU's comeback bid while giving the Knights a 5-3 overall record. While Morris ended the game in NSU's favor, it was Goffi who put them in the position to win it, recording his second hat-trick of the season... October 5: Goffi remained on a scoring tear, scoring two more goals in one half to lead NSU past visiting Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, 3-0, in an FSC match. Bloise also scored an unassisted goal... October 8: The Florida Sun Conference named Goffi its Player of the Week... October 9: Goffi scored four more goals for his third hat-trick of the season to lead NSU past visiting Palm Beach Atlantic College, 6-0. Bloise and Ruiz also scored... October 17: NSU came within two minutes of scoring its biggest upset of the season. Unfortunately, the University of Tampa--ranked No. 2 in the NCAA Division II--had other plans, tying the game late in regulation and winning it in the second 15-minute overtime for a 2-1 triumph. Mendez had given the Knights a 1-0 lead just before the end of the first half when Ruiz fed a perfect ball to him and drilled it into the net... October 19: Goffi recorded his fourth hat-trick of the season and Mendez added another two goals to lead NSU past visiting Mt. Vernon Nazarene College 9-0. Tony Crespo, Quintana, Ruiz and Jose Silva also scored... October 23: Goffi scored his 20th goal of the year as the Knights defeated St. Thomas University, 3-2. Ruiz and Cameron also scored...October 29: Barry University scored four second half goals to defeat NSU, 4-0, in Miami... October 31: Goffi rewrote the record book in NSU's 8-0 win past host Northwood University. He scored 5 goals and assisted on 2 others. In the process, he broke school records for most goals in a season, most points in a season and most points in a game, and tied the record for most goals in a game...

November 1: Goffi continued his amazing year by scoring two goals to lead the Knights to a 3-1 win past visiting Rollins College. Ruiz also scored for NSU in the 58th minute when he stole a pass and shot it into the net uncontested... November 9: The Knights fell in the FSC title match thanks to a Flagler College goal in the 14th minute of the first overtime, ending NSU's season. Cameron scored the Knights' lone goal in the 56th minute when, from a corner kick, Bloise dropped a pass to Cameron who drilled a 25-yard blast into the net.

Meet the Head Coach, Rebecca Utter...

It didn't take long for Rebecca Utter to make a mark on the rest of the Florida Sun Conference. Named head coach of the Knights' women's soccer program in April of 1996 after being an assistant coach the previous season, Utter came in to lead Nova Southeastern to a 7-1 FSC record, a 9-8 overall mark, and a berth in the FSC championship match against St. Thomas University. And, for all her troubles, she was honored by being named the Florida Sun Conference Coach of the Year.

Success is something that is not unexpected out of Utter. A South Florida resident for the past five years, Utter has already left a mark on the area's soccer scene. Born October 30, 1967, in Cherry Valley, New York, she has helped lead three high school teams to district soccer championships. In her first year in South Florida, while an assistant at Hollywood Hills High School, she helped guide the Spartans to consecutive district titles. Afterwards, she moved to Cooper City High School where, as assistant coach, she helped the Cowboys to a district championship.

During her own high school years, Utter was involved in varsity soccer and basketball for four years, starting in each sport. During her junior and senior years, she helped lead her soccer teams to back-to-back state titles, while her basketball team captured two league titles and a sectional runner-up title. Utter's honors received include: All-Star first Team, soccer and basketball as a sophomore, junior and senior; All-State Team goalkeeper in junior and senior year; Academic All-America athlete; National Milky Way Association Athlete Award winner; and the Marine Athlete Most Valuable Player for soccer. In college, Utter played keeper at Oneonta State in New York, averaging 8 shutouts per season in her freshman, sophomore and junior years. She was injured



as a senior. Utter is also involved with coaching soccer at the club level and is a grade 7 referee. She is single and resides in Fort Lauderdale.

Meet the Assistant Coach, Cindy Marcial...

One of the top local players to ever come out of the Broward County prep ranks comes to Nova Southeastern University in the form of Cindy Marcial.

Considered one of the top scoring threats both in high school and college, Marcial was virtually unstoppable. In each of her four collegiate seasons at Boca Raton's Lynn University, Marcial not once scored less than 17 goals or had less than 10 assists. Her career statistics are amazing, recording 17 goals and 10 assists in 1992 (44 points), 17 goals and 15 assists in 1993 (49 points), 23 goals and 16 assists in 1994 (62 points) and 29 goals and 22 assists in 1995 (80 points)

While at Lynn University, Marcial helped her squads capture national championships in 1992, 1994 and 1995, and finish second in the 1993 tournament. She was named Second Team All-American in 1993, and First Team All-American in 1994 and 95. 1995 also saw her capture All-Southern Regional Team and National All-Tournament Team honors. Following her senior season, Marcial was invited to play in the Umbro Select College All-Star game.

Marcial began making her name while at Cooper City High School. There, she helped lead the Cowboys to four consecutive district championship game appearances while being one of the top scorers in Broward.

She began her young collegiate coaching career last season, when she worked as graduate assistant coach for Miami's Florida International University. She has also coached at the Boca Raton Resort and Club, the Pinetree Camp at Lynn University, St. Andrews Camp in Boca Raton, Umbro clinics and at Tequesta Trace Middle School, was an Olympic Development coach, and guided the West Broward Lightning Under-16 team. She received her bachelor's degree from Lynn University in Social Studies (1996).

Q&A: Coach Rebecca Utter eyes 1997...

Q Last season was full of its ups and downs. Ups, of course, being a game over .500 at 9-8, winning five games in a row, going eight games without a loss, and advancing to the Florida Sun Conference's championship game. The downs have to be losing three in a row toward the end of the regular season, four of your last five, and falling in the FSC title game. Because of all that, do you want to remember last year or forgot about it and move on?

A "Oh, I want to remember last year, definitely. We had a very successful season. I think our I-

O loss to FIU in the very first game of the year in overtime was a very big accomplishment for us, and the fact that they're not going to play us this year is also a nice accomplishment for us. We had some great showings this past year, we had some heartbreaking losses last season that we should have won, like at FAU, but that had to do with maturity, the maturity level of the team at the time we played them. That plus the experience level, we folded in the second half. We had an outstanding game against Lynn University last year--it took them 35 minutes to score a goal and it was only 2-0 at halftime--knowing that we're playing with the No. I team in the nation and we're holding them. We ended up losing to them 6-0, but I think thanks to games like that that other teams like the bigger teams in the area, such as Lynn University and Barry University, are starting to get a little more nervous about us and are starting to ask more questions about who's coming in and who's on



our schedule and 'maybe I want to play you, but then again maybe I don't.' I think that definitely is a growing process. We had a winning record, and it was a great season."

Q As mentioned before, last season ended on a disappointing note, losing to St. Thomas in the FSC finals. How much incentive does that one loss give this team heading into 1997?

A "I think it gives us a lot of incentive, knowing that the last game of the season we should have won. And I think the girls realize it, too, because they changed a lot from the first year to the second year knowing what it has to take, such as returning in better shape in preseason. They tasted defeat last year, and they don't like the bad taste that was left in their mouths. That's going to cause them to kick it in gear. And with the girls coming in with the level of experience that's here now I think is going to make for an excellent blend of players, and I think we're going to do very, very well."

Q Whatever problems there were last year, do you think you've fixed them?

- A "I think I've fixed it. I think I've more than fixed it. We've got Jen Jenkins playing now, and she's that person. Her only job out there will be to score goals. And there's a couple of other freshmen coming in that know what it means to score a goal, and if I tell them 'I want a goal,' that's going to be their job, that's going to be their focus. I think that's going to make a big difference. We had good depth last year on defense, and now we have depth throughout the field, and that's going to be a great attribute to us."
- Q Last year, six of the eight losses were shutouts. Is the offensive part of it one of the main things that you wanted fixed this year?
- A "Yes, I was concerned obviously with goals. Our offense was one of the things that I felt needed to be fixed, and I think we fixed that with the people we have."
- Q You definitely have to be talking about Jenkins again. How much will you be relying on her?
- A "It won't just be her, though. Jennifer Jenkins and Mandi Adams will be two of the strongest people I'll be relying on this year to score some goals, to take [graduated senior] Bev Young's place in scoring some goals. Also, a young lady--Marissa Abbott--is coming in to play center-mid to replace Bev. As for Jen, she had to sit out last season, but I think that taught her a lot. She watched the games, she knows what's out there, she knows the competition that's out there. She's a dedicated player and she's a hard worker and I think she's going to score some goals this year." And as for Marissa and Mandy, they are--as far as I'm concerned--untapped resources that Florida International University, Lynn and Barry just missed. They're untapped resources in the county that, just because their high school may not have been super successful, were overlooked by the schools that should have been looking at them. They're going to be strong, very strong. Plus, we'll have newcomers Laura Prill and Elisabeth Conforti, so we'll be strong going forward."
- Q We've talked about the forwards. Now let's talk about the midfield.
- A "In our midfield we have returning players Olivia Bernal, Stacy Ann Brown, Gina Alexandrou, Krysten Riordan and Nury Zapata, which is a strong nucleus, they're consistent. They're a strong nucleus with a lot of experience and a lot of talent. As far as the new players go, Marissa will play the midfield, as will Krista Harness and Helena loannou."
- Q Realistically, you're a head coach with a goalkeeper's background and now, suddenly, you're talking about offense. Are you going into this year, then with an offensive mind now? Or will you still be more defensive-minded?
- A "I think it was very defensive last year because the assistant coach I had last year [Kathy Boutchie] and I were both very defensive, but I think this year it's taken a turn where there's going

to be a good balance. Good strong defense and good strong offense. I think we're going to need more balance this year than we've had in the past. I'm trying to break that trend of former goalkeepers being defensive-minded. It's tough to break a goalkeeper out of a defensive trend, though, which is one of the reasons why I brought in the assistant coach that I did in Cindy Marcial to help me break myself out of that trend. But probably for now, because we have a pretty tough schedule, we'll still probably be in more of a defensive mode. I'm going to have to wait and see for the first couple games to see just how those forwards that I think are going to produce are going to produce. If they do produce, then we're going to take some more chances offensively."

 ${\sf Q}$ It seems like this year's team will be more of a long-ball style offense with the defense trying to get it to speedy forwards.

A "The first year this team was in existence it played the very short passing game, which was very effective but was also ineffective. It was a strength and a weakness. Last year we worked on short passing, but also looking for the long ball which improved us as a team as a whole. But we didn't have the skill up there to finish it. This year hopefully we can continue on that combination of play, and then have people at the top that are going to be able to finish and get the job done."

Q All this talk about offense and we're forgetting about the most consistent position of all on this team--defender. Talk about who will be back there this year.

A "We have back Cindy Ojeda, and coming in to sweep will be Melissa Simmons, who was also another untapped resource from the other side of the state. She's going to be an outstanding sweeper. Very tall, very commanding, very good skills. The players that know her already respect her, including my players who met her when she came to the recruiting tryouts we had. She's taking Carrie Templin's place. We also have Jessica Goody coming back, and Heather Rogers is coming in from Western High. Helena loannou, Olivia Bernal and Nury Zapata can also be defenders. Then in goal, Liz Imperato is coming back for her senior season. She was our backup goalkeeper who ended up starting the majority of the season. It was her frst year ever playing in the goal and she did an excellent job, but the biggest thing was landing a top-ranked goalkeeper and that's Jennifer Wiggins. She's coming down from a very competitive area, Long Island, has played in Europe, has played club, has played travel ball, played high school, she's done it all. She's going to be a big attribute to the team. She's a leader, very vocal, very strong skilled, she knows how to get the job done."

Q Will this mixture be able to avenge last year?

A "Oh, yeah, I think we're going to avenge last year, I think we're going to more than avenge it. I think that we're going to dominate, I really do. I think it's important that I go in with a positive attitude about what the season's going to be. I was optimistic last year about having a good season, and we did, but this is a team that--whether it's this year or next year--has a chance of making the national tournament. I think we can do it this year."



A look back: The 1996 women's soccer season...

August 30, 1996: Three different players each scored second half goals to lead Barry University to a 3-0 win past the host Knights, but it was NSU who came off the field with a victorious feeling. Barry came into the game ranked No. 3 NCAA Division II national ranking, and was not able to score until early in the second half. NSU received its own good scoring chances from Silvia Wong and Bev Young...

September 4: Reonne Cooper scored three consecutive NSU goals and assisted on another to lead the Knights past visiting Webber College, 8-0, in a Florida Sun Conference regular season match. The 8 goals scored by the Knights set a new team record, eclipsing the old mark set the previous season in a 5-0 win past Flagler College. Young also scored 2 goals to lead NSU... September 10: The Florida Sun Conference named Cooper its Player of the Week... September 16: Young scored the only goal of the match in the 69th minute of play to lead NSU past visiting St. Thomas University, 1-0, in a FSC game. She broke the scoreless tie when Aimee Fernandez dribbled past a couple of defenders and fed the ball to Young inside the box... September 18: NSU routed Palm Beach Atlantic College, 7-0. Cooper paved the way, scoring 2 goals and assisting on a third as NSU improved to 3-0 in conference play. Amy Stone also had a goal and assist, while Young, Carrie Templin, Olivia Bernal and Gina Alexandrou also scored... September 30: Florida Atlantic University scored just two minutes into the first 15-minute overtime period to defeat NSU, 3-2, capping a dramatic FAU comeback. The Knights had jumped out to a 2-goal first half advantage courtesy of Cathy Crain. Four minutes into the match, Crain took a pass from Stacy-Ann Brown in the 18-yard box and chipped it into the net. Crain and Brown teamed up again at 34:00 when Brown sent a pass into the 18-yard box where Crain connected.

October 6: The Knights recorded one of their biggest wins in its short 2-year existence, shocking the host NCAA Division II University of North Florida, 3-2. Young, Stone and Jessica Goody each scored a goal apiece

to lead NSU to the upset win. Goody recorded the game-winner with just one minute to play in regulation, when she took an errant pass from UNF's goalkeeper and shot it right by her. The game had been delayed 7 ½ hours due to weather... October 8: Crain was named the FSC's Player of the Week... October 13: Cooper, Young, Fernandez and Nury Zapata all scored goals to lead NSU to a 4-0 win past visiting Flagler College in an FSC match amidst torrential rains... October 16: Cooper and Alexandrou both scored goals to lead NSU to a 2-0 win past host Palm Beach Atlantic College, pushing the Knights' win streak to three. The Knights allowed just two shots on goal... October 19: Against host Webber College, NSU dominated, scoring two first half goals and one in the second in a 3-0 FSC regular season win. It marked the fourth win in a row for the Knights, sixth in their past seven, and seventh in their past nine. Young, Stone and Christy Carone all scored goals... October 19: Stone scored one goal and assisted on two others, and Young added two goals to extend NSU win streak to five with a 4-0 win at Flagler College... October 22: Stone was named the FSC's Player of the Week... October 24: The win streak was snapped as St. Thomas University shut out the Knights, 1-0, in Miami... October 26: The nationally ranked Barry University squad easily defeated NSU 7-0 in a make-up of the October 6 canceled contest. NSU was held to just two shots on goal... October 30: The Knights lost their third straight match, this time to NCAA Division II powerhouse Lynn University, 6-0...

November 8: Cooper scored one goal and assisted on two others, and Wong added another two goals to lead NSU past Palm Beach Atlantic College, 4-0, in the semifinals of the FSC Conference Tournament in Lakeland, FL. Cooper first assisted on Fernandez's goal at 35:00, and then Wong's score at 55:00, before herself scoring at 86:00 off an assist from Crain. Wong opened the game's scoring 10 minutes in on an assist from Brown... November 9: St. Thomas University shocked the Knights, 2-1, in the FSC championship game. The Bobcats erupted for back-to-back goals within 10 minutes of each other in the second half. NSU cut the lead in half when Brown took a pass from Stone and shot it into the goal, but that's as close as the Knights would get as St. Thomas avenged the previous season's FSC title game loss.

About the Florida Sun Conference...

The Florida Sun Conference (FSC) is one of the newest intercollegiate athletic conferences in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The conference consists of nine colleges and universities and spans across the entire state of Florida.

The Florida Sun Conference is comprised of Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Flagler College, Florida Memorial College, Northwood University, Nova Southeastern University, Palm Beach Atlantic College, St. Thomas University, Warner Southern College and Webber College.

The institutions in the conference believe in strong educational commitment combined with balanced athletic competition. In just seven years of existence, four different FSC institutions have received the Conference All Sports trophy signifying achievement in their overall athletic program--with Nova Southeastern University leading the way with three in a row, and four in the last five years.

SEZ FS.C. W.CONFERE

Originally formed in March of 1990 as the Florida Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the FSC was established as a conference for small independent colleges and universities within the NAIA. The conference name was changed in 1992 to its current name.

The league sponsors championships in the following men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer and tennis. The FSC also sponsors championships in the following women's sports: basketball, cross country, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball.

In its six short years of existence, the FSC has quickly established post-season tradition with automatic NAIA Tournament bids to the conference champion in baseball, men's basketball, volleyball and soccer. Also, Florida Sun Conference teams are frequently found in the NAIA Top 25 National Polls in all sports. Individually speaking, athletes from the FSC have proven themselves worthy of national recognition year after year.

In addition to recognizing outstanding achievements on the playing fields in all 12 sports, the conference also recognizes achievement in the classroom. Each year an Academic All-Florida Sun Conference Team is selected. Last year, 102 athletes throughout the nine conference institutions received the award. The Athletic Directors of the nine member institutions serve as the Florida Sun Conference Board of Directors.

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association currently administering intercollegiate athletic programs to approximately 400 fully-accredited colleges and universities, more than 30 percent of all four-year collegiate athletic programs in the United States. 


The Association administers 24 separate championships in 13 sports.
