

TECHNOLOGY VERSUS THE HUMAN FACTOR IN ONLINE LEARNING

Presenter: Jeanette Muzio, Ed.D.

Session Description: Some institutions are embracing the notion of the Fifth Generation of Distance Education. To their current online tool-kit of interactive multimedia, Internet access to Web resources, and computer-mediated communications, they are considering adding database-driven automated responses to learner inquiries, even for content-related issues. However, online learners state overwhelmingly that a high degree of interactivity with other learners and with the instructor is paramount to their success. Are these two viewpoints poles apart, or is there some common ground? Muzio will use online courseware to examine which types of variables can be best handled by a computer and which require the participation of a live instructor.

PLANNING AND DESIGNING ONLINE INSTRUCTION

Presenter: Gloria Palumbo Holland, Ed.D.

Session Description: One of the most important aspects of a successful online instructional program is the planning that must take place before a single lesson is developed. Topics such as identifying instructional goals, creating learning objectives and matching assessments, sequencing instruction to build on skills and knowledge, graphic design

and learning styles, interactive and meaningful instruction, and selecting the appropriate delivery tools will be presented and discussed in this workshop. Anyone involved with creating technology-based or technology-supported instruction will gain valuable and proven skills that can be applied immediately to set the groundwork for successful student learning.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION IN THE WORKPLACE (PARTS 1 and 2)

Presenter: Laurie Nalepa, Ed.D.; Paul Sabolic, M.B.A.

Program Description: This workshop is designed to facilitate solving problems and differences with coworkers. This two-part, three-hour workshop will consist of lectures, discussions, videos, role-playing exercises, and group and individual activities. Participants will benefit by learning about the key reasons why conflicts occur; basic conflict resolution principles; recognizing how values and perceptions contribute to conflict; understanding conflict styles and resolution methods; anticipating and preventing conflicts from escalating; and effective techniques for giving and receiving constructive criticism.

Monday, July 22

SELF-MARKETING: DEVELOPING A TENURE/PROMOTION PORTFOLIO

Presenter: Kathleen L. Skrabut, Ed.D.

Program Description: Concerned about your chances to achieve tenure or a higher rank? This general session will provide a framework for planning, compiling, and presenting a portfolio for tenure or promotion. Although specific criteria may vary, all academic institutions expect a portfolio to contain evidence of achievement in the traditional domains of scholarship. Learn how to accumulate and present material that will showcase your abilities and contributions to your college, department, discipline, and community.

TAKING YOUR INSTITUTION AND DEGREE PROGRAMS ONLINE

Presenter: Leo J. Theriot, Ed.D.

Program Description: One of the greatest areas of challenge and change in higher education is online learning. This presentation describes and explains the process of preparing and placing an institution and its degree programs online from initial questions through implementation. Attention is given to courses taken for credit, as well as non-credit and self-study courses.

Tuesday, July 23

PRIDE AND PREJUDICE: OVERCOMING THE GENDER GAP IN COMPUTER SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY

Presenters: Laurie Nalepa, Ed.D.; Eduardo Jesus Arismendi-Pardi, Ed.D.

Program Description: This presentation relates to the teaching of computer science technology from a gender equity perspective. Despite the pivotal role that computers play in our economy and culture, and despite explosive growth in the marketplace, only a dismal 15-20 percent of undergraduate computer science degrees at American universities go to women. This problem is compounded with the sad reality that representation through media, peer groups, and stereotypes often sends the message that technology is the exclusive domain of white males. This presentation will benefit participants in two ways. First, specific strategies related to creating a caring and positive learning environment, establishing a multicultural and gender sensitive environment, and implementing a socially, culturally, ethnically, and gender equity model for technology training and education will be presented. Second, participants will learn about an integrative approach that incorporates values, human issues, and social impact.

COMPARISON OF THE FINAL GRADES OF STUDENTS IN INTERMEDIATE ALGEBRA WITH AND WITHOUT AN ETHNOMATHEMATICAL PEDAGOGY

Presenter: Eduardo Jesus Arismendi-Pardi. Ed.D.

Program Description: This presentation is related to the teaching of mathematics, in particular intermediate algebra, from an ethnomathematical perspective. This investigation is germane to the use of statistical methods in an effort to demonstrate and validate the importance of teaching mathematics from a global and multicultural frame. This presentation will be relevant to participants in two ways. First, attendees will have an opportunity to learn how to apply the quasi-experimental methodology to address issues in higher education. Second, participants will gain information pertinent to the importance of multicultural education and globalization of curriculum. Participants need not be knowledgeable about the particulars of mathematics education.

Wednesday, July 24

SERVING THE UNDERSERVED: DEVELOPMENTAL EDUCATION IN COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Presenter: Ingrid Lee

Program Description: To prepare students to work in the new economy, it is crucial that they have the educational foundations to adjust their learning as their future jobs will require. Community colleges are sometimes the answer for students who either never had the opportunity to learn, never chose to learn, or failed to learn in the prepostsecondary realm. Developmental education is the method of entrée for many of these students and cannot be ignored if our society and economy is to keep growing.

Attire

Dress is casual for all Alumni Forum sessions and functions. The temperature in the meeting rooms is very cool, so bring a sweater or light jacket with you to all sessions. Ground Transportation

Arizona Stagecoach operates shared-ride van service for each TIA arriving flight. Service includes transportation to hotels, resorts, the University of Arizona, and business or residence locations. Hotel/resort rates range from \$10 to \$24 per person depending on location. The reservation desk is located in the center corridor of the baggage claim level. Seven rental car agencies are located at TIA. These are Alamo, Avis, Budget, Dollar, Hertz, National, and Thrifty. All departing shuttles, vans, buses, and taxis are located on the commercial roadway on the lower level in front of the terminal.


