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
# Needs-Assessment Questionnaire Development Through the Interviews of Mothers Post Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) Discharge: A Qualitative Study

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#### Introduction

- Current literature shows a gap in documenting the experiences and needs of mothers after being discharged home from the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU).
- The literature that does exist suggests following discharge from the NICU, parents and caregivers of infants' report feelings of stress and anxiety and lower levels of competence in caring for their infants.
- A needs-assessment questionnaire can help to identify the needs of mothers.
- Additionally, literature highlights the importance of sensory interventions and the need for appropriate sensory experiences to be carried over into the home environment.

#### <u>Objectives</u>

- To enhance the understanding of the needs and experience of mothers after being discharged from the NICU with their infants.
- To create a needs-assessment questionnaire for mothers through a qualitative interview process.
- To create a needs-assessment questionnaire that will aid in providing mothers with needed resources to care for their infants.
- To create a sensory resource folder aimed at providing mothers with resources to aid in the sensory development of their infants once discharged home.

#### Summary of Needs Assessment

- Explore the needs of NICU mothers and their experiences throughout the NICU.
- Needs-assessment questionnaire to evaluate the specific needs of mothers for infant care and self-care.
- Sensory resources to enhance sensory care for infants at home.

## <u>Literature Review Summary</u>

- Current literature suggests following discharge from the NICU, parents and caregivers of infants' report feelings of stress and anxiety and lower levels of competence in caring for their infants (Lakshmana et al., 2019; Lee et al., 2019).
- There are discharge programs in existence to help combat these reported feelings however, there is a lack of exposure, resources, introduction of programs to healthcare practitioners, and a lack of participation from mothers and caregivers (Lee et al., 2019; Sobaih 2012).
- It is suggested that a screening tool be used to access mothers who have a great risk of not attending these programs (Ballantyne et al. 2021; Nwabara et al., 2017).
- Similarly, a questionnaire could also be used to identify the needs of mothers as well as identify those who are experiencing higher levels of stress and need additional support.
- Literature highlights the importance on sensory experiences for NICU infants. These sensory experiences have been linked to lowering maternal stress rates and improving infant development, indicating the need for these experiences to be carried over into the home environment (Pineda et al., 2017; Vitale et al., 2021).

#### Capstone Project Description

- A qualitative interview process was conducted, via Zoom, with a small group of mothers (n=5) who had experienced having an infant in the NICU.
- Qualitative responses to interviews-questions were coded and analyzed using a descriptive coding process described by Saldaña (2013).
- Using this coding process, codes were categorized and then separated into themes. These themes were used to aid in the development of the needs-assessment questionnaire.
- Sensory resources were gathered and placed into a Google Drive folder which can be shared with mothers to aid in the continued sensory development of their infants at home.

Learning Objectives Achieved

- Effectively conducted open ended interviews with NICU mothers.
- 2. Utilized a descriptive coding process described by Saldaña (2013) to code interviews with NICU mothers.
- 3. Created a needs-assessment questionnaire based on themes developed through coding process.
- 4. Researched and developed sensory resources and folder for sensory development of infants for mothers for home use.

#### Discussion & Conclusion

- After interviews with all 5 participants were completed, a descriptive coding process described by Saldaña (2013), was used to identify codes, categories, and finally themes.
- Implications from developed themes include:
  - Health care inconsistencies
  - Lack of standardized guidelines for NICU discharge and postpartum care
  - Not all facilities are providing adequate NICU preparation for mothers
- The developed themes were used to create the Assessment of Caregiver Needs Following Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) Discharge which, once validity is established, may be used by NICU departments and occupational therapists to begin establishing guidelines for care and providing resources for NICU mothers.
