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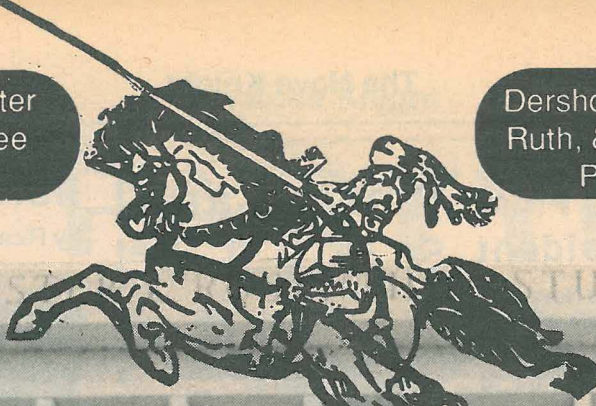

## Steeles' Honored At Baudhuin Ball

Mr. Robert A. and Mrs. Millicent G. Steele, of Fort Lauderdale have been chosen as the honorees of the Ralph J. Baudhuin Oral School Snowflake Ball. The 26th Annual Snowflake Ball will be held November 1, 1991, at the Pier 66 Resort and Marina in Fort Lauderdale. The purpose of the Ball is to benefit the hearing impaired students of the Ralph J. Baudhuin Oral School of Nova University. All proceeds (from both the ticket sales and the Children's Fund) will be applied to award scholarships to advance educational programs. Robert Steele, Vice Chairperson of the Nova University Board of Trustees, was formerly a wholesale lumberman and manufacturer. He successfully began a second career upon coming to Florida in 1962.

Often referred to as the "truck magnate", Steele was the owner of South Florida Mack Truck, Inc. and RAMS Leasing Company and is a general partner in Steele Associates, Limited.

His wife, Millicent, is a successful South Florida Interior Designer and has been a catalyst to many non-profit organiza-

tions through her leadership and support.

Robert Steele serves on the boards of many youth, health and business organizations, including the Ralph J. Baudhuin Oral School; the South Florida Council of the Boy Scouts of America and the Holy Cross Hospital, Inc. Steele is the President and an elder of the Church-By-The-Sea in Fort Lauderdale.

Millicent Steele is the founder of the Nova University Gold Circle, a support group that raises scholarship money. She has served as the chairperson of numerous charity fundraisers, including the Snowflake Ball; the Nova University Florida Derby Ball; and the Boy Scouts of America Blue and Gold Ball.

In 1985, when the Italian ship Costa Riviera had its maiden voyage in Fort Lauderdale, she created the theme "In the Spirit of America" to benefit the Kids in Distress, St. John's Foundation and Outreach Broward. In 1988, she was honored as the Woman of the Year by the American Cancer Society.

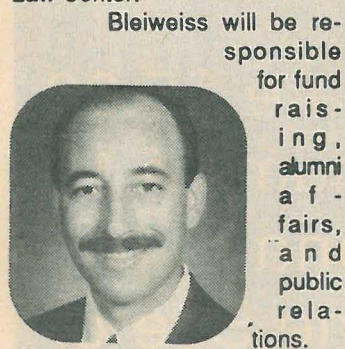

## Construction Is Still In Progress

By May 1992 there will be three new buildings and one addition on campus: Physical Building, Leo S. Goodwin Sr. Hall, a new dormitory complex, and a cafeteria.

The Physical Plant building will be completed by the end of September. The Goodwin Hall is already under way and will be completed by April of 1992.

James A. Cummings Contractors, Inc. of Fort Lauderdale is building the Law School. The Edwin and Esther

Rosenthal Student Center will be doubled in size with the addition of the cafeteria and is scheduled to be completed with the traditionally styled, (304 beds) dormitory complex in late April of 1992.

The dormitory contract will be negotiated with the Gampell Organization.

Harry Gampel, the owner, is a Board Member at Nova University. The cafeteria will soon be put to bid for a select group of building contractors.

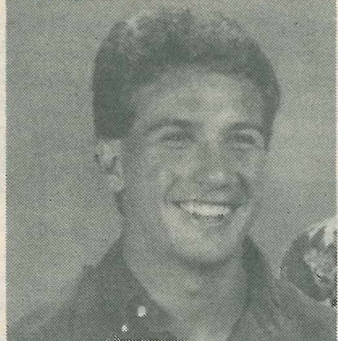
Jeff Tarnowski, the new Assistant Director of Residential Life, is eager to start working with the resident students.

of E.A.S.E. Foundation.

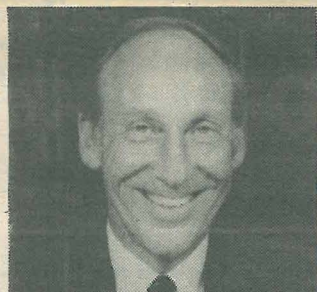
"He is someone who really cares about what's happening in the community," she continued.

## MircoLab Offers Much

The Nova University MicroLab, located on the first floor of the Parker Building is an invaluable student resource.

It is available to all Nova University Students.

The MicroLab maintains a comprehensive software collection for student and faculty use.

As a software resource, the MicroLab provides applications software for students to use in completing course assignments, including

wordprocessors  
electronic dictionaries  
grammar checkers  
electronic thesaurus  
database management  
electronic spreadsheets  
statistical programs  
telecommunications  
presentation graphics  
desktop publishing

On line services are available to students requiring access to the Unix systems (Unix is a trademark of AT & T Technologies and Bell Laboratories).

These on line services are provided through the Office of Academic Computing and Strategic Technologies (ACAST).

Monitors are available to help students familiarize themselves with new software programs.

They will assist with hardware and software problems on an as-needed basis.

However, the MicroLab does not provide individual tutoring.

As a hardware resource the MicroLab provides a choice of microcomputer systems:

IBM, Zenith/286, AT & T, Xerox, Tandy 1000sx, Apple IIe & GS, Macintosh II, SE, Acer/286, SuperSport laptop/286

Systems are configured with hard drives, 3.5" and 2.25" floppy drives. As with every privilege there are rules.

Students must present a current Nova University student ID card or a Nova University Library Card.

Students are required to provide their own data disks.

A virus scan program will be run on all disks brought into the Lab.

Scanning is necessary to preserve the integrity of student data files/disks and to protect the MicroLab.

Additional services are offered through the Office for Computer and Information Technology.

Practice worksheets, computer-assisted instruction, and interactive videos enhance the professional staff's individualized programs.

Technology; will be addressing incoming freshmen and transfer students. "The rules for college are not written, there are things students should just know," stated Judith Perkel, the moderator.

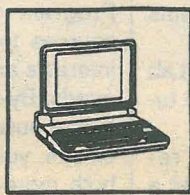

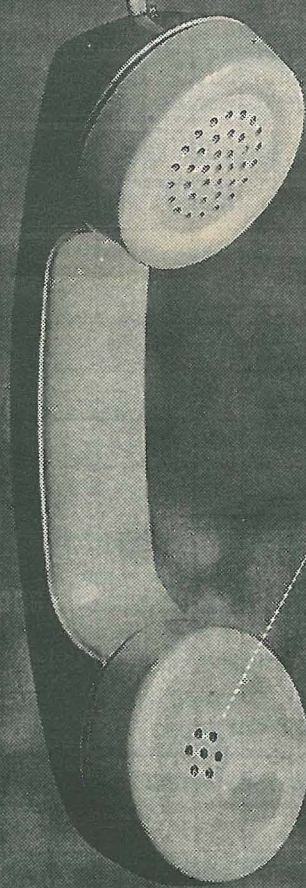

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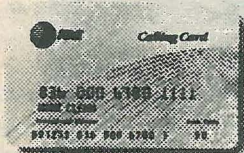
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## S of B & E Presents: Claudia Santin-Bucchi, A Modern Day Success Story

"Dreams become reality when you put them into action. Education can be the catalyst for women in fulfilling their dreams," said Santin-Bucchi.

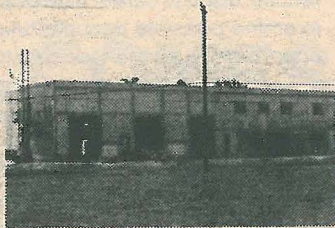

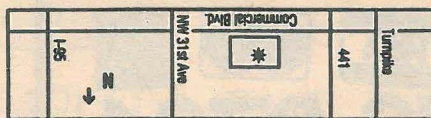

The 1991-92 school year will mark the 10-year anniversary

After spending 13 years as a high school teacher and coach in Massachusetts, Hansley made a move to South Florida.

He was hired to teach math and coach basketball and football at The University School, a private school that is part of Nova's educational system.

A year later, he was "promoted" to the position of Director of Athletics, a new position created to build, from the ground-up, Nova University Athletics.

Those early days were cetaceous for Hansley, to say the least. The athletic program officially started in the Fall of 1982, with but one sport, men's basketball.

Hansley was the Head Coach.

Hansley was also the department's secretary and promotions guy, performing numerous tasks and spending endless hours at work.

That lasted from 1982-84.

The following year was a time for growth.

Despite the fact that

Nova had a large operating deficit in 1983, the University decided to add men's soccer, women's volleyball and co-ed cross-country, in the Fall of 1984.

For one year Nova became part of the National Little College Athletic Association (NLCAA). The following year, 1985, Nova joined the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, (NAIA), and has been a member since.

by the Fall of 1987, the undergraduate enrollment had grown from 222 to nearly 1,000 students.

Again it was time for the athletic program to expand. Baseball, Women's Tennis, and Men's Golf were introduced.

The addition of baseball also gave Hansley the opportunity to make a career change. Hansley's love for baseball and the knowledge in the Northeast enabled him to take over as Head Coach of the baseball team.

Jim Michaels, Hansley's basketball assistant, became Head Coach of the basketball team.

Today Nova University has an undergraduate population of over 1200 students. Women's fast-pitch softball will be introduced in the Spring of 1993.

Nova joined the Florida Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the FIAC, with its formation in the Fall of 1990. Hansley currently serves as president.

Nova won conference titles in men's soccer and baseball.

Women's Volleyball captured five District Championships in the NAIA.

Men's Soccer claimed one in the Association.

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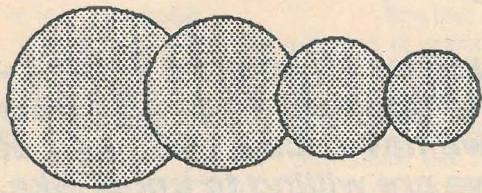
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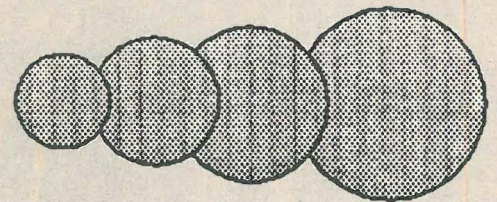


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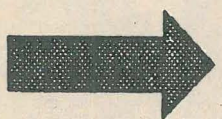

## Tim Finn Joins Little Brother's Group - Crowded House

In the last hours of the last day in a rented house in LA, Tim Finn shuffles to the front door, shoeless and unshaven to receive a caller. Soon he'll leave LA for San Francisco, where he'll perform one of his first concerts as a new member of Crowded House.

From there he and his new bandmates—founding members Neil Finn, drummer Paul Hester and bassist Nick Seymour—fly home to the bottom of the world, or nearly: Australia.

But there's still time for a cup of coffee.

Tim leads the way to the dining room table. It is a crowded enough house-hold that drummer Hester has made his

bed—and even now lies in it—in the space where the living room becomes the kitchen.

"He nobly offered," says Tim.

"He wanted to pretend to be social while secretly dozing off [while] he gets the early morning kitchen gossip," he continues.

Tim has fairly recently become the fourth member of the band—founded in 1985 by his younger brother Neil—composing for, playing and singing on the long-in-coming third Crowded House album, Woodface, an album that, like its predecessors, displays a subtly or arrangement and range of approach that makes each song a distinct statement.

The result of this new formulation can be heard throughout the album, most clearly so on the satirical new single and video, "Chocolate Cake," (Neil hears "a number of songs that are more groove-oriented" and Tim believes that "lyrically, it's less introspective"), and will perhaps be even more evident on their upcoming US tour embarking in late August.

"I think we're going to be even more combo-ish' than we have ever been," Neil says over some java.

"We were originally going to go out as a five-piece with an added keyboard player, but we decided it would be more fun and exciting with Tim on keyboards," he concluded.

## BeBe & CeCe Winans Reclaims The Term 'Addiction'

The word "addiction" may normally have unsavory connotations, but with the song "Addictive Love" from the new album Different Lifestyles, the stellar gospel team of BeBe & CeCe Winans reclaims the term.

"Addiction" has been planted in people's minds as being negative," explains BeBe. C e C e's brother.

"I want to let people know that addiction can be wonderful if you're addicted to the right thing hurt anybody."

Likewise, "blood" has somehow become a frightening term, become a frightening term, but BeBe and CeCe see it in purer terms.

"Our song 'The Blood' (which features a rap by MC Hammer) should spark some attention," BeBe continued.

"We zeroed in on a doctor's viewpoint. The one thing we can't live without is blood; it's the most important substance. Blood gives us strength and redemption and unity."

Addictions haven't hurt the multi-Grammy-winning team at all; their need is to spread a positive message and, most of
